Born in Foligno, Italy, in 1248 to an affluent, non-Christian family, Angela lived hard in her first thirty or so years, not letting her husband or

her children keep her from, as some delicately put it, "the world and its pleasures." It's said her spirituality was kindled by prayers to St. Francis of Assisi, a spirituality that would sustain her through the deaths in short order of her husband, children, and mother. Angela founded a religious community and was known as the "mistress of theologians" for her writings. Still, Angela wasn't beatified until 1701... and it was just last October that Pope Francis declared her a saint. While her feast day is January 4, I'm thinking of her as Lent approaches with its opportunity to examine how we can leave behind "the world and its pleasures" as we strive to offer ourselves up to Christ and community.
