"My policy is love" --St. Ursula Ledochowska

Once when I was speaking about the female saints and blessed, someone in the audience challenged me: Didn't John Paul II focus on Eastern Europe in his record-setting canonizations and beatifications? It is true that a number--far from all or most--of those elevated during his papacy were from that part of the world. It is also true that their stories have relevance to our lives today.



Consider Mother Ursula Ledochowska, born in Austria on April 17, 1865. She spent about ten years in tsarist-controlled Russia and Finland educating and supporting young Catholics there at a time Church-related facilities were illegal. She couldn't even wear her habit. She was expelled in 1914, then lived in Sweden and Denmark for six years, assisting young people in those areas. Ursula then went to Poland, where she had spent her early years as a sister, and founded the Ursulines of the Sacred Agonizing Heart of Jesus. It was during a visit to Rome seventy-six years ago this month that she died. We remember her on May 29.

I think of St. Ursula Ledochowska as we see Christians persecuted today in so many places in the world. She didn't let politics or civil authorities get in the way of serving God's people. May we do the same today.

Being Christ in Our Lives: Monica McBrady

"Never see a need without doing something about it," Australia's first saint, Mary of the Cross MacKillop liked to say. Mary would have loved Monica McBrady. Monica made her Cursillo Weekend in New Jersey, and when she and her husband moved to



Northern Virginia, they were both struck by just how much the Cursillo teams had to do to prepare for Weekends beyond the most important thing: getting to know each other so they could reflect Christ to the candidates.

Thanks to Monica and Mike, Cursillo in the Diocese of Arlington now has a pilot going in which Cursillistas beyond the team are responsible for buttons, room signs, snack tables, and the like.



On the Nightstand: Still Life

A novel is on my nightstand again this month, and I can't wait to dig in. It's *Still Life* by [Christa Parrish](#). It's the story of two very different women--one raised in a fringe religious sect, one who's wandering through an unhappy marriage. They encounter each other when the second woman gives up her seat on a plane to the first woman's husband (who took her out of the sect)... and the plane crashes, leaving no survivors.

I've never met Christa in person, but we have a mutual friend in [Virelle Kidder](#), and for a time we were all in the same online writing critique group. Christa's won a Christy award for her writing, and one of her earlier books, *Watch Over Me* (set in the county where my father grew up and including a passing reference to my family's name), was named the Evangelical Christian Publishers Association's 2009 book of the year. Christa's style and tone set her apart from other Christian novelists; her characters have real flaws as they struggle toward wholeness in the Lord. If you haven't read one of her novels, give her a try. You'll be glad you did.
