Faustina. Oh, Faustina. How could someone like me, as proud of my Polish heritage as I am of the English and Irish lines, have not turned to you earlier? I suspect it had



something to do with this saint, who died October 5, 1938, at age thirty-three, was so single-minded in her drive to fulfill Jesus's requests related to the Divine Mercy devotion. (The Divine Mercy image shows Jesus providing a blessing with his right hand; touching his heart, with rays radiating from it, with his left hand; and the words "Jesus, I trust in you" near the bottom. Catholics observe Divine Mercy Sunday the Sunday after Easter). Faustina's laser focus on the Lord at times put distance between her and other members of her congregation. Her intensity seemed almost, well, frightening.

But during Lent this year, I found myself returning again and

again to an incident that occurred when Faustina was nineteen. She was at a dance with her sister, and Jesus told her to go to Warsaw, eighty-five miles away, and join a convent. She left that night, without even talking with her parents. And so, inspired by her, I surrendered to something I knew was the Lord's desire but not mine. It's funny--or not--how much better I've slept and prayed and lived since.

Being Christ in Our Lives: Nora Lawson


For the past ten years, Nora Lawson has been the go-to person for funerals at a
