Virginia (feast day, December 15) knew a bit about difficulties and disagreements. Born in Italy in 1587 to aristocratic parents, she wanted to become a woman religious. But her parents moved forward with plans for an arranged marriage when she was fifteen, a marriage to a man who drank and gambled too much. He died five years later, having repented, leaving her with two daughters. Virginia began working among the sick and elderly, part time at first, then devoted herself to this ministry after her daughters had grown. In its heyday, her organization had several locations serving hundreds of people and had



government-encouraged sponsors. Eventually, Virginia left the leadership and went back to begging on the streets for those she served. Ironically, more than half her twenty-plus grandchildren entered religious life. Her story reminds me of the importance to serve where the Lord puts us, even if it's in a parish or job or ministry that is not what we had in mind.

Patricia Watson, a wife, mother of two, and grandmother of two adorable




